
Our Learning

Rowan	It is Global fortnight and Rowan class are looking at the idea of sustainable food production and working collaboratively. We welcomed Rhona Sutherland, a local beekeeper into school on Monday. She told us lots of information about how honey is made. We have created posters about why bees are important and how we can help to save them. Today, we have dissected a flower and looked at different types of pollination.	Next week we will be exploring more about sustainability and how we can grow crops to feed our future planet. We are looking forward to getting together at parents evening to see our progress so far! In Maths we will be exploring statistics and representing data in different forms.	
Syca- more	It has been a very busy week in Sycamore! We started off the week by completing a trail around school to find facts about Africa in order to complete our factfile. On Wednesday, we made our Sudanese bread in the morning and made sandwiches with it in the afternoon. We had very mixed opinions on the taste of it! In English, we have been interviewing characters from our global book in a hot seating activity to help us write our newspaper reports. In art, we have painted African landscapes and used black card to create silhouettes on top.	Next week, we will be finishing our newspaper articles for our global writing. In maths, we will be starting our new multiplication and division unit. We will be looking at the Hindu celebration of Holi on Wednesday by making rainbow fudge. On Thursday, we will be celebrating Easter. In science, we will be looking at development through childhood.	
Maple	This week we started our global curriculum work. The theme is 'sustainability'. We have been learning about endangered animals and what we can do to prevent their extinction. The children have thoroughly enjoyed our text 'Will we miss them?' based on animal conservation and how we can protect our environment. The children have produced some fabulous pencil sketches of the creatures featured in the text. In Maths	Next week we will be continuing our global curriculum work. On Wednesday we will be learning about the Hindu festival 'Holi'. The children will be writing some acrostic poetry using their new knowledge of Holi. In Maths we will be continuing to develop our knowledge of improper and mixed number fractions. In DT the children are looking forward to making and tasting our healthy sandwiches. The children have designed some interesting candwich combinations!	
Silver Birch	we have been comparing and ordering mixed number fractions. This week we have completed our non-chronological reports on sharks. They had so many interesting facts in them. In maths we have begun a new unit on 2D and 3D shapes. In art we printed using Indian style relief blocks and made our own printing blocks using lolly sticks and elastic bands. We read our Global book, Dear Earth and started our global activities.	signed some interesting sandwich combinations! Next week on Tuesday, we will go on our trip to Helmsley walled garden. We will be looking at the symbols and logos linked to rubbish and recycling as we find out what they mean. We will be creating some ocean themed art work and we will be talking about what we recycle and reuse at home.	
Oak	This week, we have enjoyed taking part in a Spring hunt with Mr Smith around our school grounds. We have been looking for budding plants, signs of new life, green leaves and flowers. We enjoyed visiting the daffodils at the front of the school and creating some still life pictures. We have also been enjoying reading our Global story 'Oliver's Vegetables'. We have been making lists of all the fruit and vegetables that can be grown to go on our Star Writing wall. We have also been learning about what it means to buy fairtrade food.	Next week, we will be looking at foods that are fairtrade and marking on a world map where some of these foods are from. We will also be learning how growing our own food can make us sustainable and how it helps our planet. We are looking forward to celebrating Holi next week and learning all about this colourful, Hindu celebration. We will also be learning about Easter and creating a piece of art work to show the Easter Story.

Ministers have confirmed plans to ban the use of mobile phones in English schools and have released guidance for headteachers. The guidance is not statutory and offers schools different ways of introducing the ban. These include an order to leave all phones at home, handing them in on arrival, keeping them in inaccessible lockers or allowing pupils to keep them, on the condition they are not used or heard.
